FROM THE PASTOR - October 2023

Since my first year in pastoral ministry (1981 for those keeping score) I have said that EVERYTHING is scheduled in October. While we shake off the summer doldrums and we hit the ground running in September, it is really in preparation for the busy-ness and business of October. It still feels that way to me. As you look through this edition of the Stepping Stone, you will see lots of activities in October and in the coming months. And the Board of Stewards is preparing their flyer which will highlight our coming special events and which will be sent out to every address in the 13159 zip code.

It can be frustrating trying to schedule these events, activities, and meetings. In fact, for those who are most involved it can be downright exhausting! And yet the activity of a congregation is one barometer of the health and vitality of a congregation. A congregation that is stagnant, not moving, not growing, might well be in survival mode; i.e. doing enough to get by one more month without having to close down. We pray for churches in survival mode that the Spirit would come and reenergize them. Many, if not most, congregations were in some degree of survival mode during the pandemic, so we all know what it is like. Our activity level here at TUCC suggests that we are NOT in survival mode.

Yet it is not about being busy for the sake of being busy. Another of my favorite sayings is this: "The church is not a club, like the Elks, the Masons, or the Rotary. And we don't operate like the Historical Society or the Library Boards." They all do good works on behalf of the community and of people in need and we thank God for them. What I mean by that is, what we believe and what we do and how we live our life as a congregation is completely based on Jesus' words and example. So, if someone asks, "Why do you have a ministry to the Kurds, or Why do you do a luncheon every Tuesday for the Senior Citizens, or even Why do you sponsor the Red Cross Blood Mobile," the answer is not (only) that these are good things to do for people in need, but that we are imitators of the Christ who brought Good News to those in need and who showed by example what the Kingdom of God was like.

So as we are going about doing good, feeling busy with lots of busy-ness going on that pulls at us and requires our time and energy, just remember – we are missionaries to a world that needs the Love of God in Jesus Christ.

Moderator Message

Preparing For Emergencies At TUCC

The Kroms provided information about emergency preparation to church leaders at the fall huddle. TK Krom ensured that the group knew where all exits and fire extinguishers were and reviewed response to fire emergencies. There was also a quick review of fire extinguisher use.

We reviewed emergency evacuation and proper interaction with police and rescue personnel. We were provided with NYS Emergency Information materials. Copies of these are available in the Fellowship Hall.

Finally, Terry Krom gave us pointers on "stop the bleed" which highlighted how to think about managing shooting victim and strategies for slowing bleeding in extremities.

The Tully Free Library Revitalization Project

The Tully Free Library Board requested that the church members receive information about the current library revitalization project.

During the 2019 strategic planning process, survey of community members and organizations found that there was a strong desire to have more space for tutoring, quiet activities and computer use.

The Board hired an architect to help evaluate the structural integrity of the library and to consider options for improving space use to meet the needs of patrons. The study done by the architects and consultant engineers suggested the importance of

Improving safety:

installing fresh air ventilation and an energy-efficient heating system for improved air quality, establishing an addressable fire alarm system that connects all fire and smoke detection devices.

Increasing accessibility

making the circulation area more user-friendly, with a new service desk that is ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessible, opening the entryway to expand visibility and access to all library spaces.

Expanding usability

Reconfiguring space to add two study rooms for quiet tutoring and more community meeting spaces, relocating the fireplace to a quiet reading nook, redesigning the entrance foyer to include movable glass partitions so the Padget Community Room is integrated with the main library space, Adding an elevator to improve access to second floor storage and work space

The library received a New York State Library Construction Grant for \$805,857 which covers 75% of the project including architect and engineering analysis. The Board is responsible for raising the remaining 25%. We have already received generous grants and donations and continue our fundraising efforts.

The goal is to begin construction in 2024 and keep the library functional through much of the work.

There is information in the Fellowship Hall on more specifics about the project and fundraising events.

Did You Know....?

"And if a stranger sojourn with thee in your land, ye shall not vex him." (Leviticus 19:33 KJV)

From the Pentateuch (that is, the 5 Books attributed to Moses: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy) to the beloved story of Ruth, to the Psalms, and throughout the Gospel, scripture exhorts us to welcome the strangers—the foreigners—in our land, and to treat them as we would treat our "own." The ancient rationale for this was that the Hebrew people were sojourners in Egypt; as we read further, especially in the Gospel, Jesus broadens this reasoning to a less legalistic and more gracious approach: God's love, for all of Creation, and especially for all humankind, created in God's own image. TUCC's ministry to our Kurdish neighbors affirms our commitment to this scriptural mandate.

According to various dictionaries, a sojourner is simply a temporary resident. Modern translations of scripture use alien, migrant, immigrant *etc.* instead of sojourner. All of these are consistent with the meaning(s) of the original Hebrew. But in the geopolitical realities of 2023, it's not at all simple. Take, for example, our Kurdish neighbors. Are they Refugees? Aliens? Migrants? Immigrants? While we, the Church, reach out with love, in Jesus' name, to all newcomers to our town, region, and country, it is essential for us to have a basic understanding of newcomers' legal status. Why? Because legal status determines what other resources may be available to help our new neighbors to thrive in their new home.

So, here are a few legal definitions:

- Temporary resident =a foreign national granted the right to stay in a country for a certain length of time (e.g. with a visa or residency permit), without full citizenship. (US Citizen and Immigration Services)
- Alien = a foreign-born person who lives in the United States, has not naturalized, and is still a citizen of a foreign country, according to the US government. (various sources)
- Migrant = "...someone who changes his or her country of usual residence, irrespective of the
 reason for migration or legal status. Generally, a distinction is made between short-term or
 temporary migration, covering movements with a duration between three and 12 months, and
 long-term or permanent migration, referring to a change of country of residence for a duration
 of one year or more." (United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs) Note—
 migrants can also be people who move from one part of their country to another.
- Refugee = "...persons who are outside their country of origin for reasons of feared persecution, conflict, generalized violence, or other circumstances that have seriously disturbed public order and, as a result, require international protection. The refugee definition can be found in the 1951 Convention and regional refugee instruments, as well as UNHCR's Statute." (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees)
- Immigrant = "...a person living in a country other than that of his or her birth. No matter if that person has taken the citizenship of the destination country, served in its military, married a native, or has another status—he or she will forever be an international migrant." (Migration Policy Institute)
- Immigrant = "Any person lawfully in the United States who is not a U.S. citizen, U.S. national, or person admitted under a nonimmigrant category as defined by the INA Section 101(a)(15)." (US Dept of Homeland Security)

Scripture does not make these fine—one might say almost pharisee-like --distinctions! Psalm 39:12 captures this, along with our very human sense of separation—or alienation—from God, and our desire to be at peace and united with God, and with all Creation, through Jesus Christ.

"Hear my prayer, O LORD, and give ear unto my cry; hold not thy peace at my tears: for I am a stranger with thee, and a sojourner, as all my fathers were." Psalm 39:12 KJV

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

FISH (Friends in Service Here) is a volunteer organization that provides transportation to medical appointments for individuals unable to drive themselves and unable to arrange other transportation. The program is primarily sponsored by PEACE, Inc. It currently serves those residing in the towns of Fabius-Pompey, LaFayette and Tully.

Drivers and Dispatchers are needed in all 3 communities.

<u>Drivers:</u> The minimum commitment is one drive a month that is scheduled on a specific day, according to your availability. Some drivers choose to be "random drivers." They agree to be called for rides that have no scheduled driver or when there may be two drivers required in one day. Of course, the random drivers have the option of declining a drive if they are not available. Volunteer drivers are equipped to provide transportation for the ambulatory only.

<u>Dispatchers:</u> Dispatchers are assigned one week (Monday - Thursday) a month, according to their availability. They receive calls from riders, take their information regarding their needs and call the driver that is scheduled for the day needed, passing along the information. Being a dispatcher does not require you to sit at home waiting for your phone to ring on your week. You can carry a cellphone with you wherever you go or let the rider leave a message on your home phone. Then call them back as soon as you can. Riders are required to call at least 3 days prior to their appointments.

Riders: Riders are also needed. Since, Covid, the number of riders has decreased.

The FISH program is a free service. All drivers and dispatchers are volunteers. Please spread the word that more drivers, dispatchers and riders are needed.


