-ADVENT CANDLE LIGHTING-

Liturgist: Advent is a time to turn away from meaningless distractions and to notice and count our many blessings. Advent is a time to let go of bitterness and resentment and to spread peace to the world around us. The Advent Wreath is a symbol of preparation. The circle of evergreens reminds us of the everlasting covenant offered in the birth of Jesus. The four candles, one for each of the four Sundays in Advent, symbolize HOPE, PEACE, JOY, AND LOVE. Today, we light the candles of Hope and Peace as symbols of Christ, the Prince of Peace.

People: Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid." (John 14:27)

(The first and second candles are lighted)

Liturgist: May the light sent from God shine in the darkness to show us the way of Shalom - Peace. Together let us pray:

People: Prince of Peace, reveal yourself to us today. We need peace in our lives, our homes, our families, our church, and our whole world. Help us to slow down and seek out the peace you provide, so we may become peacemakers for ourselves and others. In the name of Jesus Christ the Prince of Peace. Amen.

Celebrant: In Advent we wait, we prepare, we hopefully and diligently watch for the coming of the One who is the fulfillment of God's promise of hope, of peace, of joy, and of love for all the world.

Celebrant: At Christmas time in our homes, we enjoy decorating with lights and candles, evergreen garlands and wreaths, nativity scenes and Christmas trees and other decorations to celebrate in a festive way the wonderful story of the birth of our Savior, Jesus. In the same way, our church family enjoys decorating the sanctuary to celebrate the birth of Jesus. This service of scriptures and songs helps to explain the symbolism of the several decorations and to gain a deeper understanding of the mystery, the glory, the wonder of the coming of God's Son, Jesus, Emmanuel, God-With-Us!

-THE PARAMENTS-

Reader 1: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill made low. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all flesh shall see the salvation of God." Isaiah 40:3-5 **Reader 2:** We now place the Advent paraments, which are purple, a royal color to remind us of the glory of the King of Kings, who came to be the "Light of the World."

People: With cloth of purple we proclaim him who is King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

(The banner is turned and paraments are displayed on the altar, pulpit and lectern)

-WREATHS AND GARLAND-

Reader 1: "The glory of Lebanon will come to you, the pine, the fir and the cypress together, to adorn the place of My sanctuary; and I will glorify the

place of My feet. The sons of your oppressors will come bowing before you; all who despise you will bow down at your feet and will call you the City of the LORD, Zion of the Holy One of Israel." Isaiah 60:13-14

Reader 2: People of God, as we enter through the doors of the church in order to worship, so we enter through the doorway of Advent to celebrate the Christian year. On this Second Sunday of Advent, let us mark the entrance to the church building and our hearts and minds as portals for Christ to enter into our lives.

People: With these wreaths, circles without end, we remember your everlasting love, O God, and we give you praise.

(Wreaths for the doors and garlands for the organ pipes or elsewhere are placed)

**CAROL "Lift Up Your Heads, Ye Mighty Gates" Vv.1-3 #213

1. Lift up your heads, ye mighty gates; behold, the King of glory waits; the King of kings is drawing near; the Savior of the world is here!

2. Fling wide the portals of your heart; make it a temple, set apart from earthly use for heaven's employ, adorned with prayer and love and joy.

3. Redeemer, come, with us abide; our hearts to thee we open wide; let us thy inner presence feel; thy grace and love in us reveal.

-POINSETTIAS-

Reader 1: Hear the prophecy of Isaiah, "A voice says, "Cry out." And I said, "What shall I cry?" "All men are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field. The grass withers and the flowers fall, because the breath of the LORD blows on them. Surely the people are grass. The grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of our God stands forever."

Reader 2: The "Flower of the Holy Night," the poinsettia, is the most widely used Christmas-time flower. It was discovered growing wild as a tall bush

in Mexico and was brought to North America by Ambassador Joel Poinsett, where it was developed into the type of flower we have today. The star-shaped center of the bloom reminds us of the star that shone on that first Christmas, while the blood red petals remind us of the gift of Jesus on the cross.

People: As in your birth you brought the assurance of God's presence, so by your blood, O Jesus Christ, may we be redeemed and made whole.

(Poinsettias are brought in and placed about the sanctuary)

-DECORATING THE WINDOWS AND ALTARATION-

Reader 1: The prophet Isaiah further prophecies:
"A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.
The spirit of the LORD shall rest on him, the spirit of wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and the fear of the LORD.

His delight shall be in the fear of the LORD.
He shall not judge by what his eyes see, or decide by what his ears hear;
but with righteousness he shall judge the poor, and decide with equity for the meek of the earth;
Righteousness shall be the belt around his waist, and faithfulness the belt around his loins.

Reader 2: The wolf shall live with the lamb,

the leopard shall lie down with the kid,

the calf and the lion and the fatling together,

and a little child shall lead them.

The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox.

The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp,

and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den.

They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain;

for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the LORD

as the waters cover the sea.

On that day the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples; the nations shall inquire of him, and his dwelling shall be glorious." Isaiah 11:1-10

Reader 1: The sprigs of holly placed in each window are signs of Christ's passion. Candles remind us of the true Light that Christ brings. The Altarations speak to us of drawing closer together, sitting at the table, around the Advent Wreath, sharing food and fellowship. All nature will tell of the glorious grace of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

People: The garlands of green in the windows and the decorations in the baptistry bring us joy and remind us of all you give that delights us, O God. (Holly and Ivy garlands and candles are placed in the windows and the Altaration is Lighted)

-THE CRÈCHE-

Reader 1: The Good News of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ.

As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way,

the voice of one crying out in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight,' "

so John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And the whole Judean region and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him and were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the strap of his sandals. I have baptized you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

Reader 2: John the Baptist, the cousin of Jesus, fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah as the one crying, "In the wilderness, prepare the way of the Lord." As we place the manger or crèche on the altar, we are reminded that Jesus was born in the humblest of places, so that the humblest of humanity would see and understand the compassion and inclusion of God. Jesus has compassion on all God's children - from the humblest to the richest.

People: With manger and stable, figures of Mary and Joseph, the infant Jesus, shepherds, magi and angels, we remember the story of your coming among us, and we praise you, 0 Lord. (The stable and the animals only are brought in and placed on the altar)

SHARING JOYS, AND CONCERNS PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE AND THE LORD'S PRAYER (using "sins")

Bidding: Come, O Holy One, **Response: come and save us.**

Celebrant: As we prepare the way of the Lord, let us offer prayers to God who will baptize us with the Holy Spirit and fire saying: Come, O Holy One, **come and save us.**

Liturgist: O God of all, God of shalom, we come before you with hearts seeking to know and understand the words of the prophets, the words of the angels, the words of peace that rise around us in this holy season. We pray that you will open us to the meaning of peace, that you will teach us the way of peace, that we will indeed understand your will for justice for all of your world. Help us be faithful to the call that you have put on our hearts to live as people of hope. *Come, O Holy One, come and save us.*

L: This joyous season puts many demands on our lives. We pray that you would slow us down, open our hearts, and our eyes, that we may see the beauty of the season, feel the joy of hope and peace alive within us and live our days in celebration.

Come, O Holy One, come and save us.

L: For so many this season is, however, a season of sadness and pain. So many are struggling with illness, some with routine colds and flu, while others are

touched with illness that threatens their lives. We pray that you will touch us all with your healing balm and that you will look with favor and blessing upon us. We especially remember those whom we have named aloud and those we bring to you now in the silence. (brief silence) May we all appreciate and celebrate the gift of life that you have given us. *Come, O Holy One, come and save us.*

L: Give us grace and hope to live our days as your people, for it is Jesus' coming that we celebrate and he is indeed our Christ, the Prince of Peace. *Come, O Holy One, come and save us.*

Celebrant: O Root of Jesse, who comes as a sign of God's justice, hear our prayers and help us always to hear the prophet's call to turn our hearts to you, in the name of Jesus Christ the Savior who taught us to pray, saying:

"Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever. Amen."

Reader 1: The Minor Prophet Micah, brings us a word of hope from the minor town of Bethlehem:

"But you, O Bethlehem, from you shall come forth one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from ancient days. And He shall stand and feed His flock in the strength of the Lord, in the majesty of the name of the Lord His God. And they shall live secure, for now He shall be great to the ends of the earth; and He shall be the one of peace." Micah 5:2,4

Reader 2: In ancient times the cedar was revered as the tree of royalty. It also signified immortality, and was used for purification. We have placed this tree in the sanctuary as a symbol of Christ, who reigns as King forever, and whose coming will purify our hearts.

People: With a tree we also remember Jesus Christ's death on a cross for us and our salvation, and we give thanks for God's great gift of love.

Celebrant: As our final preparation for the coming of Jesus, the Light of the World, we will light the Christmas tree and the star. And in this time of Advent, whenever you see a lighted tree or star, let it call to mind the One who brings light into our darkness, healing in our brokenness, and peace to all who will receive Him. May this tree and star, aglow with beauty and splendor, remind us of the life-giving cross of Christ, that we may always rejoice in the new life that shines in our hearts.

(The Christmas tree is lighted)
